- General medicine clinics
- Women's clinics (cervical cancer is primary cancer killer of women in Guatemala)
- Wellness clinics
- Monthly diabetes and hypertension clinics
- Community empowerment programs
- Construction of meeting centres to be used as medical clinics in rural and remote Guatemala



It's been another successful and impact driven year in Guatemala!

NHI-ACE received **14 groups** of undergraduate nursing and nurse practitioner students from the US. We visited **26 communities** including **7 new communities** with which NHI-ACE has not worked previously. We also welcomed Clemson University for the first time on our Global Health Partnership (pilot) Program.

Overall, we assisted over **6,000 people** through our programs, held 6 general medical and women's health clinics, lasting 3 to 4 days each and gave over 2,000 medical consults and treatments including medicine, free of charge. We were able to construct one multi-use medical clinic in a local community, start a pilot program focused on community empowerment working with the leadership committee and John's Hopkins University and facilitated the installation of 69 healthy stoves, benefiting over 600 individuals.

We also provided **Global Health and Cultural Exchange programs** in partnership with 14 U.S. Universities, welcoming over 200 nurses to the program as part of our dual mission. What a year it's been!

We currently have a waiting list of communities asking for our help that we do not yet have the resources nor the university or other nursing partners to serve. Our plan has never been to grow for the sake of growth, but rather has been to to support, follow-up and keep providing sustainable care and services to our partner communities.

Over the years, we have been able to **sustain this growth** with the introduction of **new university groups** and with the support of a **grant from an anonymous donor**. This year, the grant will be reduced by 50%, followed by another 50% reduction the next, **doubling our fundraising requirements**.

Our biggest challenges for this next year are related to our changing funding model and the need to find more wonderful supporters to join our NHI family.

IMPACT

One of the biggest ways to determine impact is client satisfaction.

Each year, through word of mouth, we receive requests for medical and school clinics from community leaders in Guatemala. Anyone familiar with Guatemala understands that though there is high demand for medical assistance, a community will not reach out for help unless they have a trusting relationship with a medical provider, even if they are in desperate need.

For this reason, it is an honour for us to receive these requests and to see the positive impact on these communities. These relationships strengthen our resolve to face the challenges of fundraising to expand our programs to help more people in need in Guatemala.

Stories of our community partners





Maria, 58 years old from Bosarreyes, Ciudad Vieja, Sacatepéquez.

Maria was a recipient of one of the stoves from our high efficiency wood stoves program in January 2019.

After receiving the stove, Maria experienced the difference on her health and saw the environmental and economic benefits of using less wood to cook her meals. She decided to become a leader in her community to manage the local program and provide stoves to the people around her.

Maria said that NHI has helped and inspired her with great health and after this inspiration she has helped NHI to reach many other people in need.



José Luis Ramiro, 53 years old from Pacoxpón, San Martín Jilotepeque

Don Ramiro is a community leader of Pacoxpón and is of Maya Kaqchiquel descent. He is currently a student of the Faculty of Humanities, School of Social Work, University Mariano Gálvez of Guatemala.

At 15 years of age, Ramiro Tay was orphaned by the consequences of the Civil war-internal armed conflict that was experienced in the eighties in Guatemala. Since then he has participated in the community development processes to improve the health and development of his community.

Don Ramiro is currently the leader of the health committee and has been working closely with Nursing Heart in the community empowerment pilot program. The NHI staff are supporting monthly activities to improve the health conditions of the residents of Pacoxpón to reduce the effects of poverty and improve the health and living conditions.




REVENUE






